Getting to Ferrara

The closest airport is **Bologna Airport**. Once landed, you can either get the Bus to Ferrara (via services easily accessible from the airport, such as the bus shuttle **Bus&Fly** that reaches the center of Ferrara directly) or by reaching the Bologna Train Station (by public transport bus from the airport) and then a 30-min/1h train to Ferrara.

Getting to the S. Lucia Auditorium

The S. Lucia Auditorium is located in Via L. Ariosto, 35 (Ferrara). You can use Google Maps with this <u>link</u> to get directions to the auditorium. Once you enter the building, turn left and follow the corridor all the way to the end. Once you have reached the end of the hallway you can turn right. You can access the auditorium to your left.
